Course Overview

Students will learn to research, draft, and revise assignments. They will identify and analyze rhetorical concepts such as audience, purpose, stance, and rhetorical strategies. Students will practice processes of invention, drafting, revision, and reflection.

Course Goals

- Identify arguments in a composition.
- Analyze a writer's rhetorical strategies.
- Evaluate arguments on the same topic.
- Compose your own researched argument.
- Write a focused thesis statement.
- Practice critical and charitable feedback.
- Practice revision techniques.
- Use a consistent citation style.

Assignments

Summary (15%)

Students identify and summarize a writer's argument (or arguments) in a text. They should identify and discuss the rhetorical situation including stance, audience, and purpose.

One long summary (500-600 words)
One short summary (150 words)

Synthesis (25%)

Students connect (synthesize) what others have said about a research problem. They should synthesize multiple perspectives for a thorough, nuanced view of informed conversation about the topic.

1500-2000 words

Rhetorical Analysis (20%)

Students analyze how a writer communicates their argument(s) to their audience given their context and purpose. They should identify and discuss strategies, discuss how effective those strategies are, and connect the text to its context.

1000-1200 words

Portfolio (20%)

Students demonstrate their growth as a writer throughout the semester.

They should curate content for portfolio and write a reflective essay to accompany their materials.

1000 words
